GOALS OF THE 2004 NWP ANNUAL MEETING

We are thankful to the Open Society Fund–Prague for hosting the 2004 NWP meeting, "Building the Future of Our Women's Movements," the first all-network meeting to take place in a new European Union (EU) member state. We will use this opportunity to reflect on how EU accession has affected the position and status of women in a larger Europe and beyond.

It is also the first meeting since the transformational strategy for national women's programs was announced by OSI President Aryeh Neier and NWP Sub-Board Chair Sonja Licht on July 23, 2003. The strategy was approved by George Soros, the OSI Board, and NWP Sub-Board in April 2003, and was further refined at the NWP annual meeting in Istanbul in July 2003. As a result of these policy decisions over the last three years, major developments have been happening within the NWP:

- The majority of women's programs of national foundations have started or completed feasibility studies to
 guide and inform their transformational strategies;
- Almost half of the national women's programs have transformed or are in the process of transforming into independent institutional partners (IPs) of NWP;
- All network-wide NWP projects have developed new strategies oriented on sustainability of networks.

Ultimately, 2004 and 2005 are crucial years for a successful transition from a network of women's programs in the national foundations to a network of autonomous institutional partners. This important structural change in the institutional make-up of the NWP has prompted one set of goals for the Prague meeting:

- to reflect on the changes that have happened at the national, regional, and network levels;
- to identify what works and what does not work and to find solutions for further effective development;
- to provide relevant technical assistance to institutional partners and women's programs;
- to learn about transition experiences from other partner programs, networks, and organization.

Another set of goals for the Prague meeting has been defined by the significance of 2005 as a year of strategic impact for the global women's movement: It is the year of the 10th anniversary of the Beijing World Conference on Women, the 5th anniversary of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), and the 10th Forum of the Association for Women's Rights in Development (AWID). In line with NWP's mission of "bringing the OSI 'traditional' region to the world" and connecting local, regional, and global women's movements, NWP has invited key representatives of global and regional networks, and of the OSI network, in order to:

- ensure that the original OSI region can make a difference at key 2005 forums and to identify connecting themes and issues among different regions;
- provide space for critical thinking on the role of the women's movement in the new geo-political reality;
- share plans and develop ideas for strategic cooperation among regions and networks.

The meeting is conceived as a laboratory of ideas. Less time will be devoted to formal reporting than to brainstorming, identifying and solving problems, and envisioning and planning for the future. Sessions are in the form of workshops and panel discussions.
